

Great Bardfield Primary School


t is hard to believe that we are already heading toward the end of the Autumn Term at Great Bardfield Primary School. All of the signs that Christmas is on the way can be seen and heard in and around school; children in corners rehearsing lines for the Nativity; discussions in the kitchen about the Christmas lunch menu and the sound of Christmas carols being taught by our wonderful music teachers.

This year at school we will be kicking off our Christmas programme of events with a trip to the Town Hall on 1st December to watch the Pantomime. We are so grateful to our PTA for arranging this annual event which is thoroughly enjoyed by both children and staff. It is lovely to be able to use local facilities and for the children to be able to walk up through the village to this activity.

Other events in the run up to Christmas include our Nativity production, the Key Stage Two Carol Service at St Mary's, Christmas lunch, our annual Christmas market where children shop 'til they drop and a special Santa's Grotto organised by our wonderful PTA. Christmas really is a busy but very special time here at school.

This month, we have been raising money for the charity Children in Need by wearing 'Spots and Stripes' and for the Royal British Legion by selling various 'poppy paraphernalia' in school. A great cause closer to home has been fundraising for our Year 6 residential trip to the Isle of Wight. We have an unusually small group of Year 6 children this year, making the cost of the visit per head rather more than in previous years, so in a demonstration of resourcefulness, the children have suggested some fundraising activities. The first has been a cake sale which raised a huge £80 towards their trip.

Last week in recognition of Remembrance Day, some of our children, along with pupils from other local schools exhibited some beautiful artwork at St John the Baptist Church in Finchingfield. Our children submitted paintings which represented the theme of 'Life in the 20th Century' based on their studies earlier in the term on 'The Great Bardfield Artists'. The display looked very professional and we definitely have some 'Bardfield Artists' of the future at school. As is tradition at our school, every child made a poppy containing a message of hope to be attached to the fence and Ravilious Class laid a wreath at the war memorial in the village. I was very proud of the respect and thoughtfulness shown by our Year 6 children.



Many thanks to all those involved. After costs, almost £2000 was raised and split between the PTA, Pavilion Fund, Great Bardfield Pre-School and Little Bardfield Cricket Club. Planning Applications

- Little Lodge, Braintree Road replacement of roof tiles. No objections
 providing the Historic Buildings Officer is satisfied with the materials
 to be used.
- Keepers, Braintree Road single storey extension and conversion of garage to residential. The Parish Council were concerned about the loss of off-street parking on this busy road, and the lack of clear plans of the elevations of the property which is in the Conservation area.

Update - Planning Appeal - 56 Houses on Braintree Road

The appeal hearing took place on 15th November, and we await the Inspector's decision. The Parish Council were represented by Geoff Gardner of Gardner Planning, an experienced planning consultant. Our thanks go to him for the work he has put in and access to his expertise. Also speaking on behalf of the village, in opposition to this development, were a member of the Parish Council, the Historical Society and residents of Deer Park View.

Community Garden

Review: The Bardfield Players

he Town Hall was full every night for the Bardfield Players' performance of Being of Sound Mind by Andrew Hull. This murder mystery, produced and directed by Ian Ruffle, featured some familiar faces and also some newcomers to the team. In the opening scene four people have been gathered together in a remote country house to hear the reading of the will of the late Edward Goodchild by James Brunt, solicitor (Steve Hudspeth). All have different reasons for being there. Brother and sister Penny and Stephen, played with relaxed confidence by Emily Robshaw and Sven Steinbauer, are hoping for cash. Erstwhile glamorous film star Rebecca Lockhart played by Marcia Bryan with elegance and a fine sense of melodrama, desperately

wants to know the truth about her sister's death. Martine (Sheree Riley) is clearly puzzled, having no idea why she is there. However, the solicitor reveals that to get a single penny they must first survive a night in the house. What could possibly go wrong?

There were some strong character portrayals notably by newcomer to the Players Mike Brown who brought an appropriate sense of gravitas to the role of Marshall, the butler, but also showed his potential for tackling more serious roles. An intense scene where Marshall engages in a deep discussion with Martine (Sheree Riley) showed the ability of both actors to sustain the attention of the audience. Another new member, Sally Beanland, brought an underlying sense of sinister intent to the apparently meek and subservient role of Susan, the house maid, conveyed well through body language and facial





Our first meeting for your new 2024 diary is Saturday, February 24th at 2.30pm in the Town Hall. Our speaker will be Lucy Skellorn. Title of talk "Revival of a Garden and Plant Collections"

Lucy holds the National Collection of Irises introduced by her great, great grandfather Sir Michael Foster, known as the father of iris breeding. Her interest was sparked when she was training to be a gardener and discovered the work of her illustrious ancestor.

Lucy has made it her mission to find as many of Foster's irises as possible, her journey has led her to the Chelsea Flower Show and work with the Garden Museum.

She trained in fine art and is now a researcher at Benton End House and Garden Trust, the home of the late artist and plantsman Cedric Morris, who developed a range of irises commemorated in his paintings. Cedric's garden was a collector's cabinet of rare and unusual plants, revered by botanists and known to the iris fraternity for the 90 cultivars of bearded irises that he bred, many of which carry the Benton prefix.

Hear about the history of the garden during Cedric's time and how it

inspired artists and gardeners alike, going on to have a profound effect on 20th-century horticulture.

The Garden Museum recently acquired the house and its grounds, intent on turning it back into a place of study once more. Learn more about the history and future plans for this exciting project in Lucy's talk.

Tickets for the talk will be £8 each (for members) and £10 for non-members - this will include tea, coffee and homemade cakes. There will be a lucky ticket draw and raffle.

GREENFINGERS

his is the December issue that lasts till the 1st February so 8 weeks of gardening to write about for the bleakest weeks, quite a challenge. Methinks of the pleasant tasks first. Let us talk of trees but not those that are adorned with lights and decorations, but Crab Apples, called, in Latin, Malus. These are such an asset to any garden and if short of space train one in a fanned way along your fence. Easily done by tying on horizontal canes fastened to your wall or fence so it grows along instead of out. Good choice of fruit coloured pink, orange or red. John Downie is a bright variety but pink Sentinel is likely to stay on your tree all winter. All have pretty blossom in spring, treat yourself or put it on your 'wanted' gift list.

Activities for a mild, dry day

- 1. Trees: glistening trunk of a silver birch requires some water and a scrubbing brush to give the shining white.
- 2. To get the best from hellebores cut to the base the leaves showing blackened foliage
- 3. Wisterias need to have spurs off the main branches trimmed to buds for good flowering.
- 4. Check on dahlias you may have dug up, turned upside down with their stems cut off, left to dry in a frost-free place e.g. the shed, Now wrap them in newspaper and put in a cardboard box
- 5. No frost to give the magical look to your garden's dying foliage? You may wish to sacrifice any future chance of a sprinkling of white albeit attractive, by cutting off, clearing the area and piling on the mulch of home-made compost, bought stuff or spent mushroom compost, then plants are snug and the garden looks cared for.
- 6. Any bulbs will be vulnerable to squirrels having a snack or the casual dining of a passing muntjac, never mind covering with wire netting, use twigs stuck around them, preferably spiky ones such as rose prunings or holly. And at the mention of this seasonal bush, may all your trees be full of berries!!

From the Vicarage...

recently happened upon a discussion amongst some clergy colleagues about Christmas Carols, and particularly whether there were any which might strike a raw nerve when considered alongside the continuing fighting in the Holy Land. The 'little town of Bethlehem' doesn't lie still and peaceful, but finds itself close to one of the worst periods of unrest in that part of the world in recent years. At first sight, it might seem insensitive to sentimentalise such a troubled region, and disregard its suffering by repainting it with the serenity of a Christmas card image.

Whatever your answer to that question, it is worth us remembering that, at the time of Jesus' birth, Bethlehem also found itself surrounded by uncertainty and unrest. The uneasy relationship between the Romans and the Jewish people resulted in various outbreaks of violence, and we have evidence of how insecure those in power felt, from King Herod's reaction to the news of a new king born nearby, to the brutal way in which the Roman authorities treated those who rebelled against them.

If we only think of Christmas as a picturesque family scene, we're missing a very important part of what it is about. What Christians celebrate about Christmas each year is that it is a response – a response to the cries of a troubled world, of troubled people. Which is why it is important to remember both the unrest into which Jesus was born, and the unrest of our own day, and recognise that they are connected.

So when we sing of the 'little town of Bethlehem', about how it lies still and silent in its dreamless sleep, we are telling a story of how God crept, unnoticed at first, except for a few shepherds, and a few star-gazers from a land far away, into our world. We believe that he does so still, and that the first people to see God's presence among us are often the poorest or most marginalised, the ones who are most deeply affected by the world's troubles.

As we celebrate Christmas this year, we remember that the way in which God enters into our world today is through our actions and words. At the end of 'O little town of Bethlehem,' we sing 'Be born in us today.' Keep your eyes open to see where God is born in us today, beyond the stories of human brokenness and suffering, and hear the echoes of the time, those two thousand or so years ago, when a few witnesses gathered in Bethlehem and saw Emmanuel: God with us.

Nature Notes - Black Heron

esterday afternoon on my dog walk down by the lakes I spotted a very strange sight I could not believe my eyes, There was this strange thing gliding smoothly but quickly over the water very much like a swan or a goose would move but it looked like a heron with its long straight beak, But it was all black and I have never seen a heron move on water like that; they just wade on their long legs in shallow water or fly as do all the egret family of birds. So home to do some research. Out with the books on water fowl and Google, and lo and behold there is a black heron but it lives in Sub-Saharan Africa from Senegal and Sudan to South Africa but found mainly on eastern half of the continent and Madagascar, but it



has been seen in Greece and Italy. Have I seen a Black Heron or was it something else? I can't be sure, I wonder if anyone else has seen it. I wasn't able to get a photo due to the fact I was wearing wet weather gear and my phone was under two layers of clothes I remain convinced that is what it was, It may easily have been a black heron after all, we are witnessing strange things possibly due to global warming. We had Wally the walrus doing a sightseeing tour, and killer whales up the Thames so nothing should surprise us. It has been a very interesting exercise



learning something about the Black Heron; one remarkable feature is the fact that it has a unique fishing technique, living in a hot sunny place it stands up to its knees in the water, forms its wings into a circle casting an area of shade on the water. Fish swim into the shade so making easy picking for the long pointed beak, most of the other features of this bird are pretty much the same as the rest of the egret family i.e. nests up in a tree, likes shallow water, diet consists of fish and small crustacean. Well, as interesting as finding out about the black heron was, I am feeling a little bit silly as there have been more sightings on the lake and it was in fact a cormorant! Compare the two pictures it was a dull wet afternoon. Can I be forgiven? Please.



Winter stories

Being the festive season, it seemed only right to have another look at some Bardfield Christmas traditions over the years.

The late Rev Norman Clift compiled sketchbooks and notes about the village and these are a rich source of amusing anecdotes. When talking about The Bell he says:



"A clergyman was once imprisoned in The Bell and in 1653 he managed to escape. I was tempted to ask why he should have wanted to escape from such an agreeable place until I realized that this was during Oliver Cromwell's time – when many ale houses were closed and even Christmas dinners were forbidden. The unfortunate clergyman may have been the Rev'd John Mowe, the curate of Great Bardfield, who was brought to trial at Thaxted for bowing to the altar in Bardfield church."

This from the late Elsie James' oral history:

"When the river froze all over as it frequently did in those days, we used to go sliding and men went skating. There was a public grass patch just over the bridge in Bridge End, that's now covered by a garden when new houses were built in later years. As a small child I was taken by my father to a night skating party and a fire was lit on this grass to heat up drinks."

This from the late Peggy Swift's recording:

"One year, I think it was 1926, it was Christmas day and we'd got an aunt and uncle and cousin from Braintree staying with us... we had Christmas, but on Boxing Day morning the road was absolutely full of snow – right up to our windows. Our back door opened outwards so we couldn't open that but we eventually got it open. We had to get a shovel and push the snow like that – it was absolutely thick. And it was so incredible that I can't really describe it. And Dixon's Road - you know, what they call Beslyns Road, the man had to feed the animals and they got a scraper and it was high – right across. He just made a pathway to get to the farm so that they could come out. We were snowed up for ages. ... It took ages and ages for it to thaw out."

wo brothers born in north Wales in the 16th century have significant links with The Hundred Parishes. Thomas and Hugh Myddelton were younger sons of Richard, governor of Denbigh Castle. Both came to

London to seek their fortune.

Thomas Myddelton was born in 1550, the fourth son. He did indeed make his fortune in trade and became Lord Mayor of London in 1613.

In 1615, Thomas bought the manor of Stansted Mountfitchet as his country seat and began the erection of a new Stansted Hall. He died in 1631 and was buried at St Mary's Church. His funeral was lavish; the family even paid for the mourners to be suitably dressed. There is a fine memorial inside the church with a life-size effigy under a decorated arch.

Hugh Myddelton was born in 1560, the sixth son. In London, he was apprenticed to a goldsmith and later became Royal Jeweller to King James I.

Hugh became a selftaught engineer. He was largely responsible for construction of The New River which ran for some 20 miles, taking fresh water

from springs near Great Amwell into London. He helped fund the project and also secured financial help from the king.

The New River was opened in 1613, following the land contours so that gravity carried the water all the way to the Clerkenwell area of London. In 1620 a half mile extension was dug to supplement the supply by taking water from the nearby River Lea. After 400 years, the man-made New River still takes fresh water to the citizens of London; it is now operated by Thames Water.

Hugh Myddelton died in London in 1631. A memorial stone was erected on an island in the river at Great Amwell and various roads and properties along the route bear his name.
