### **Editorial**

iving in our lovely, peaceful village it's easy to forget the dramatic events taking place in the world outside our 'bubble'. Fires, floods, earthquakes, war and economic crises tearing families apart and driving people from their homes. We often have a deep suspicion of 'strangers' but, over many years there are plenty of examples of Bardfield residents offering help and hospitality to those in need. Many people took in evacuees, from predominantly the East End of London during WW2, and a number stayed and made Bardfield their home. The Aldridges at Place House took in refugees and the Bawdens at Brick House gave lodgings to the Spanish barber who worked in Vine Street - his singing could be heard around the village. More recently, hospitality has been offered to people escaping the current war in Ukraine. George Mills made regular journeys to Eastern Europe with aid for children whose lives had been shattered by the Chernobyl disaster and for many years to Ukraine following Russia's annexation of the Crimean Peninsula.

Some families can trace their roots in Bardfield back for many generations. For more recent arrivals, Bardfield is their 'escape to the country'. We've all come here from somewhere. So, it's interesting to have articles in this issue from people who have reached out to those who most need support in a world in turmoil. Doug Alexander and Alex Turnbull have written an account of their recent journey to bring desperately needed ambulances and medical equipment to war-torn Ukraine (p.26). On p.10 Jacqui Braithwaite shares her experience of a visit to the controversial asylum centre in Wethersfield. It's good to have different perspectives and new insights.

Also in this issue Mac Beanland gets controversial about 'No mow May' (p.28) and Headtecher Mrs Crow introduces us to Merlin the new school dog (p.3).

### **Great Bardfield Parish Council report**

### **Co-operative Stores Refurbishment**

We understand that the Co-op Stores will be closed for 6 weeks from 6<sup>th</sup> October for refurbishment. The Parish Council have supported the Co-op's application for a pop-up shop to be available whilst works are on-going in order to provide some essential retail services to the community.

### **Wethersfield Airbase/Asylum Centre**

We understand that almost 100 people are now in residence at the old Wethersfield Airbase. In August, representatives of the two closest Parish Councils, Wethersfield and Finchingfield, had the opportunity to visit the site and a report by Jacqui Braithwaite of Finchingfield PC is included in this edition of the *BT*. This report is useful and informative, and explains some of the processes for dealing with asylum applications, information on some of the individuals now living at the centre and observations by those who visited.

We expect that the use of the centre will increase over the next few months and understand the Home Office are monitoring all aspects of the programme.

Braintree District Council intend to progress with a Judicial Review of the decision to house asylum seekers at the airbase without consolation or planning permission, the government having used emergency powers to do so. This Review is due to take place on 31<sup>st</sup> October & 1<sup>st</sup> November.

### **Planning Applications**

Listed below are the applications considered by the Parish Council in August and September:

- Springfield House, Bluegate Farm: side extensions and outbuilding no objection
- Greenacre, Brook Street: rear extension and garage conversion, no objection provided the Historic Buildings Officer is satisfied with the materials to be used in the Conservation Area.
- Co-op Stores, Brook Street: installation of canopy, chiller, freezer and refrigeration plant. No objection provided all necessary noise mitigation is in place and neighbours' views considered.

- Great Lodge, Braintree Road: glamping pods and associated facilities: no objection provided concerns on access raised by the fire & rescue service are addressed
- Corner Pin Cottage, Bridge End: side extension. No objection
- Shorthorn Grange, Bushetts Farm: erection of stables. The PC objected to the scale and design of these proposals.
- Little Lodge, Braintree Road: listed building consent for interior works and replacement roof. No objection provided the Historic Buildings Officer is satisfied with the materials to be used.

No objections to proposed tree works and maintenance at Odds N Ends, Bridge Street.

#### Update - Planning Appeal - 56 Houses on Braintree Road

The date of the appeal hearing has now been postponed to 18<sup>th</sup> October. The Parish Council will be represented. Anyone else wishing to speak at the hearing should give advance notice via Braintree District Council, appeals@braintree.gov.uk or directly to the Planning Inspector's office at VE.RT@planninginspectorate.gov.uk for the attention of Aimee Peckham.

### **Bus Services Consultation Ends 5th October (Save the Number 9 bus)**

Essex County Council are currently consulting on bus services and the 9/9A service to Braintree is one of those that may be stopped or see route changes. This service is essential to some members of our community and its loss would mean increased isolation. The Parish Council have objected to this potential loss of one of our only services, pointing out that the poor service levels experienced in recent months (late and cancelled buses) have impacted on user numbers.

### **Footpaths**

We expected our footpaths to receive their annual cut by ECC Highways

over the summer. Unfortunately, this has not happened, and we know that many of our footpaths have been impassable having become completely overgrown. We would like to' big-up' our village handyman, lan Ruffle, who has cleared several paths over the last few weeks including those beyond Vine Meadow, the Walk adjacent to the playingfields, the footpath behind Mill Close and the permissive path that runs behind the bungalows on Bendlowes Road. This is not usually part of lan's job so we thank him for these extra efforts to ensure some of our footpaths can be enjoyed again without nettle stings, bramble cuts or just giving up and going home.

A reminder to landowners that they also have a responsibility for ensuring public rights of way on their land are kept clear.

### A visit to the Asylum Centre

ast week I was part of a group shown around the Asylum Centre at the Wethersfield Base. I met some of the people currently being housed there, saw their accommodation, had some lunch with them and generally got a feel for the place and people. I'm not sure what I was expecting but I came away thinking it's actually not the worst use of the space.

Now, we all know the base is not a great location for major development of any kind, there just isn't the infrastructure. And we also all know that there are thousands of homeless people already in this country who need looking after too. But that's not what this is about. Rightly or wrongly, the Asylum Centre is happening, and how we deal with it as a community will have a huge impact on us all for years to come.

We need to remember that the people being moved onto the base are just that, they're people. Their lives are on hold while they're there,

and with the current processing delays they could each be there for a couple of years or more. That's a long time to live in fear, surrounded by hatred. If we don't find a way to help them it'll be almost impossible for them to remain the decent human beings they surely were when they were forced from their homes in the first place. To live a reasonable life, people need to be active and they need to have hope of a future. Surely, as decent human beings ourselves, we can see that, and do what we can to help them.

If we as a community can make this site work well, then quite simply, it's better for everyone. Obviously, the people at the base will benefit if they are able to live the next year or two in a safe environment. And for the many good people around here who can see this for the human tragedy it is, it will also be great to know we're doing what we can to ease the suffering of these poor souls. But even for those in the third group, the people who are afraid to go out at night, afraid to walk their dogs around the fields, the people who've decided to believe the racists and think we're all in mortal danger – it'll even be good for them if we can make the base work. Because quite simply, if the base is good and the people there feel that it's their home, they are less likely to come wandering around our villages. And finally, if they are granted asylum and come out to live amongst us, it'll be much better for everyone if we haven't turned them into traumatised wrecks.

Right now the 'Hate' campaign is bringing out a nastiness in many people. I've seen some comments on social media lately that are truly appalling. But you should know, for all these weeks we've had asylum seekers at the base, the only time I've felt intimidated was when the lowlifes from Britain First showed up in the village. They are the people we should all be campaigning against. If left to peddle their hatred they will continue to separate our community and do far more long-term damage than the people seeking asylum could ever do.

Let's stop the hate and make Wethersfield Base a brilliant example of what good can be achieved if we work together with compassion and tolerance.

The Historical Society comprises a small committee. New members to the committee and the society as a whole are very welcome.


We would really love more volunteers to come forward so that the Museum and Bawden Room can be opened more frequently.

### **GREENFINGERS**

ongratulations all you clever gardeners, those who clipped back the hardy geraniums and 3 weeks after ,flowers appear again, and clipped again and had a 3rd flowering. A result of the warm autumn. Hurrah to all who diligently watered pots of gorgeous summer plants, watered through the drought, watered through the cool of July as pots need watering even if it rains, and kept them well tended through the Indian summer.

Cheers to those who have given thought to the next seasons, scattered seeds of hardy annuals, cornflower, marigold, white of Orlaya (something less common) and the common poppies. Great choice here of easy to grow corn poppy red, Californian poppy orange, maybe pink and white too plus the grey leaved giant of a poppy Somniferum. Common name opium poppy. Aha, quite safe here as they only become potent in truly hot climates like South America and Afghanistan so no 'trips' to be had just a scattering of seeds available on your bread to be baked.

Now here is a tip for spring. If your garden thrives on temporary summer plants like cosmos and all the big tender plants, in particular the salvias when they disappear with the onset of winter, place pots of tulips and wallflowers on the spot in the border. This way they provide an elevated spring display and are easily moved when ready to plant out the giants for the summer.

An easy planting idea, particularly around your vegetable area, divide chives to make more plants, acquire dwarf pinks, these are very fragrant. Alternate the two along the edge of a border. Result, a pretty display from the end of April to mid summer.

Warning, thieves about so anchor your pots and statues. Chain your olive trees to the house wall and flood light the vunerable areas so criminal activity is more likely to be spotted.

### The Tuesday Club

n August our guest speaker was Sheila Gunson, also known as The Bag Lady, who gave us a very amusing talk on her passion for making bags from materials which might not otherwise be useful, some spare curtain material or an old pair of jeans perhaps. But who would have thought of making a bag (and skirt) with men's silk ties? Or a glamorous sequinned evening bag from an old bra? As to the shopping bag made with a pair of pants, I shall leave that to your imagination! What a clever and funny lady, I shall be looking at bags in a new light.

In September Michael Bardell gave us a "Virtual Tour of Braintree Town Hall". We learned that the Town Hall was a gift to the people of Braintree from William Courtauld, who wanted "no expense spared" in fashioning this grand civic building in the centre of town. And this mantra was fulfilled, with the original estimate of £10,000 rising to over £50,000 by completion in 1928. It was officially opened by the Earl of Crawford with the words "I declare this building open and dedicate it to the good government and prosperity of your ancient town of Braintree".

During WWII the statue on top of the bell tower was covered in sacking, perhaps to distract attention and to help the building avoid strikes from the German bombing raids. There is an alternative (if apocryphal) reason for the building escaping unscathed, which was that Hitler admired it so much that he wanted it preserved to be used as German government offices following an invasion. We shall never know.

On 10<sup>th</sup> October our speaker will be Rose Griffin Twiddell, who will be talking about The First Essex Witch Trials. Rose is a popular and experienced speaker, and we are looking forward to this one.

We meet in the Town Hall on the second Tuesday of the month. Doors open at 2.00 and talk starts at 2.30. We do hope you might like to come along and join us, non-members pay £5 including refreshments, and if you decide to become a member you will only pay £25.00 for the whole year.

### From the Vicarage...

he beginning of this month sees the season of Harvest come to our churches. Of course, harvest has been going on for many weeks by now, and the traditional celebrations in church mark the traditional time of its completion. As such, it's a time for reflecting – looking back on what the past year of growing has produced, and giving thanks for all which is good.

If you look at some of our favourite traditional harvest hymns, you will find this idea extended a bit more widely – the yearly cycle of sowing, growing and harvesting is seen as an illustration of our lives, as we sing lines such as

Grant, O harvest Lord, that we Wholesome grain and pure may be.

As such, Harvest time is a good opportunity not just to look back and give thanks for the fruitfulness of the land, but also on our own lives. Indeed, as our understanding of human effects on the environment increases, we realise that our relationship with the fruits of the earth is something which ought to give us much cause for reflection. As we head into the season of autumn, it is another way in which the Church's year is matched to the pattern of nature around us. As the world draws in towards a winter sleep, we are invited to think about what marks our lives will have left – what will have been our fruits for the harvest?

But if that seems rather melancholy, the parable of nature reminds us that this is all part of a cycle; in November we will enter the season of remembrance, and then in December, we celebrate the coming of light into darkness, just as new growth unseen lies beneath the ground. We will, once again, greet the spring time and the coming of Easter, perhaps calling to mind another hymn which connects us to the land: 'Now the green blade riseth from the buried grain.'

In a world which is always in a hurry to move forward, it's good to be reminded of the benefits of looking back – of self-reflection and thankfulness. Hopefully this harvest season will be an opportunity for us all to do just that, and our churches are a perfect place to find the space for that to happen.

### David Slow: a country gardener

t's at least 50 years since David Slow began to work in the garden at Baddow Cottage alongside his mother, Kathy. The cottage, like others in the village, was once two, built in the 1840s and converted in 1900.

It has a pleasing symmetry. Behind the cottage a pantiled washhouse, exactly centred, has two kitchens, with the coppers for laundry facing each other and two outside toilets back to back, reflecting rural

life in the Victorian period.

The garden surrounds the house on three sides, a red-brick path runs its length through beds full of flowers, herbs and vegetables – beans – runners, broad and French, salad crops and root vegetables. There are fruit trees including a venerable Warners' King weighed down with fruit which David says 'has got to be a hundred years old.' The garden looks out over open fields with a view towards Hawkspur Green.

Although an engineer by trade David has been gardening all his life. At 16 he worked for Edward Bawden in the garden of Brick House and later for John Aldridge at Place House where he took over from Mr Perkin, working alongside John Aldridge apple picking, hedge



clipping, managing the orchard and lawns. He recalls the gardens and the characters of these two artist-gardeners both of whom had a fondness


for exotic, sculptural plants such as Canna and the toxic Giant Hog Weed which featured frequently in their art work. He recalls that after a gardening session he would often sit down with John Aldridge and 'put the world to rights over a bottle of Abbot – that's a treasure.'

In contrast Edward Bawden would bring a tray with tea in a china cup and iced biscuits down the garden. 'I always knew when he was coming by his warbling whistle!'

What does he love about gardening? 'I'm from an engineering background so I like creating a bit of order - getting one over on the bindweed. There's pleasure in seeing the seasons change - when the veg start taking off in the spring. Now that I'm not ruled by the clock I can while away hours out there - stay out until the light fades and the midges start biting and then go in for a cup of tea.'

### **Nature Notes - No Mow May**

Cannot think just how many years I have been doing my Nature Notes in the *Bardfield Times*, but I know I started the Shalford Parish magazine some five years ago. It has been my policy to avoid anything controversial and to try to stick to nature but I have become very saddened in recent years at the way we farmers (yes I still consider myself a farmer at heart) are blamed for the decline in wild life. Farmers have always been considered to be custodians of the countryside and wildlife and we still are. Yes, farming practices have changed in some areas as economic situations have demanded but there are large areas of the UK where they



have remained the same for centuries. Those areas are still being affected by a decline in some species of wild life and to add to our problem there are a few people with some very funny ideas who seem to be able to influence the policy makers. One such idea is No Mow May. It might have seemed like a good idea at the time but it wasn't thought through. Local Authorities loved it, it saved them a job cutting the verges but it led to some very dangerous situations on the rural roads and very much reduced

the variety of wildlife habitat. All we finished up with was a lot of dead dry grasses of the most vigorous varieties and they are the ones which have shed a lot of seed which will dominate next year's sward. Wild life thrives when it has a variety of habitat, by mowing a narrow strip along the road side with one cut done early, you encourage young green grass to grow along with wild flowers like daisies, buttercup, clover, vetches and many other wild flowers which are nectar producers and good for our pollinators. It is the principal of life; every plant, creature and organism has the same basic aim in life and that is to reproduce itself and grass is no exception. It reproduces itsself by going to seed, then it dies but if we mow it or graze it, it keeps growing weather permitting, and tries again to go to seed. Another (bright idea) is to reduce livestock numbers in the New Forest, Dartmoor, Lake District, Fells, and Peak district when we all know it is the livestock which has created those places and the livestock have always lived in harmony with wild life. I am also a big believer in producing our own food and being less reliant on imports, surely this war in Ukraine must be a wakeup call. We are very fortunate living in this district as we have fresh local food producers and farm shops so let's use them. The 'experts' need look very carefully for other reasons for the decline in wild life and I can list a number of reasons, No Mow May is one of them. It may have saved local councils some money but it has left roadside verges with a mass of dead grass which is useless for wildlife, is hazardous to road users and if we had a dry summer would have been a big fire risk.

### **Ambulances to Ukraine**

nyone up early in Great Bardfield last Thursday (14/9) may have been surprised to see a convoy of three ambulances driving through the village! This was not due to some incident locally but something else altogether.

We all know how desperate the situation in Ukraine is but sadly it is fading from the news somewhat. We also know that an offensive is ongoing and we can be sure that this will bring many more civilian and military casualties. It is also well known that treatment in the first few minutes/ hours of a casualty incident is critical to their chances of survival.

Ukraine is desperately short of all things military and this is clearly a governmental role. However, they are also short of ambulances and medical supplies. AND THIS IS WHERE WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE. With the help of various contacts, not least of which is the Christian Medical and Dental Association (ICMDA) and through the generous donations we have received from other charities and work colleagues we arranged the purchase and equipping of three ex-NHS Ambulances, with medical equipment including treatment for wounds and burns.

We set off to drive to Lviv. With six of us driving, two per ambulance, we were able to drive pretty non-stop to Ukraine. The drive took us via the Eurotunnel (to whom thanks must be given for providing free transport for humanitarian freight) through France, Belgium, Holland, Germany and Poland. Then after a bit of sucking of teeth and lots of stamping of paperwork we were through the border and into Ukraine. Another 90 mins driving and we reached Lviv about 30 hours after we had left Great Bardfield.

We were warmly welcomed at the Charity's warehouse and briefed on the amazing work that is being done there. We had time to spend the night in Lviv which is a beautiful city. It was very noticeable, however, that there were very few young men around. On Friday morning we were shown around the hospital where so much good work is being done.

So far we have raised just short of £35,000 and would like to see this grow



to £100,000. We have plans for more fundraising events and a return trip to Ukraine in the spring with more medical equipment and more ambulances.






