# **A JULY THANK YOU**

he first day of July was dry and warm and we were delighted to welcome over 180 visitors to our garden at Brick House, Finchingfield on behalf of the National Garden Scheme.

The National Garden Scheme (NGS) has a rich and interesting history going back to 1926 when, at a Queens Nursing Institute committee meeting, one of their members, Elsie Wagg came up with the idea of raising money by tapping into the nation's passion for gardens. A year later the NGS was founded, and garden owners were asked to open their gardens for "a shilling a head". In that first year a total of £8,191 was raised from 609 gardens.

Today some three thousand gardens are opened under NGS raising more than £3 million for a range of national care charities, with Essex gardens contributing £161,000 of that total.

Our garden was in full bloom and with the warm weather it was wonderful to see so many families, many accompanied with their dogs, stroll around, and then enjoy the wide range of refreshments provided and served by a team of volunteers. Thank you team; but a special thank you to all those that came and contributed to the total of £1827 to the NGS charities. We are delighted with the success on the day and have agreed to open again next year on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> June 2024.

### **Bid win for Community Garden and Open Spaces Fund**

e are very excited to announce that we have won a bid for a grant to help us develop the Quiet Space for community use. You may not know the piece of land we would like to develop it is situated behind the Town Hall in the village. Currently it is just an overgrown area and is not very often used. We would like to make the area into somewhere which is attractive for local people and will offer the opportunity for people to come together for community activities. We would like these to include growing food, celebrating events and meeting each other in a safe and attractive outdoor space. We see that there will be the opportunity for those visiting to "get in touch with nature" as we know not everyone in the village has a garden.

We envisage the possibility of a Village Band event once a year and possible other opportunities to bring the community together. We want to include the establishment of a gardening club for children in partnership with the School and Pre-school and after-school club.

The vision for the area would include planting some fruit trees, installing some raised beds, establishing some wildflowers, making some paths through the grass and providing bird nesting boxes and bug hotels.

We hope to start the project in November with the clearing and tree planting and then organize some events to launch the garden/community space. We will need help with all the tasks as so far there is just a small number of people who helped put the bid together.

# The Tuesday Club

n October our speaker was Rose Griffin Twiddell, who gave a very interesting talk on The First Essex Witch Trials. In the 1500s there were more witch trials in Essex than any other part of England, four of those witches living in Great Bardfield, all men interestingly – Henry Chitham, William Asplin, Edward Mason and Alan Moore. It was actually relatively easy to be branded a witch, you just needed to have a white cat (the black ones came later), have eyes of a different colour or the wrong number of fingers or toes. Quite often though, the accusation came about following an argument with a neighbour, where one neighbour cursed the other, the next week that neighbour's pig died, and hey presto you were a witch. Since these trials could lead to the hanging of the accused, the moral seems to be not to fall out with your neighbours!

Incredibly, witch trials continued until the early 1950s under the Witchcraft Act 1735, although the last conviction was in May 1944, when a Helen Duncan received a sentence of nine months imprisonment.

So, if you would like to try a spell, this one may help a wish to be granted: "You must wear something orange, dig a hole in the garden, write your wish on a piece of paper, wrap a clove of garlic in the paper and bury in the hole. Plant an orange flower on top. If the flower flourishes your wish will be granted, if it withers then you are unlucky this time" Good luck!

On 14<sup>th</sup> November Will Edwards will be giving a talk on Christmas Puddings. Some of us may remember making a wish while stirring the Christmas pudding, so we look forward to hearing more about these lovely seasonal delights.

# **Bardfield Boules Competition 2023**

he finals of this year's Boules Competition took place on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> September, the weather was kind to us and many spectators arrived to spend a sociable, enjoyable afternoon watching the last 4 teams play off for the ultimate position in this popular village competition. Thank you to the Town Hall committee and particularly Patrica Walsh and John & Chris Maidman for the BBQ and refreshments, and The Bell, of course, for keeping players and spectators lubricated. The Bardfield Boules Competition raises money for the Town Hall, and entry fees, Finals Day BBQ etc raised a total of £549.94 for Town Hall funds.

The competition had kicked off as usual in early May with 44 teams of 2 signing up to play. All games are played at the Town Hall (is it a boules court or is it a carpark??). The first round games took place May to July (this involved 100 games across all groups). The top 2 teams in each group (16 teams in all) progressed through to Round 2, a knockout round. By the end of August, we were down to the last 8 and the quarter finals, which had to be completed in advance of the Grand Finals Day.

The final 4 teams were Tom & Louise Grinstead (last year's champions, and several times over the years), Rory Hitchcock & Cam Meldrum (previous



finalists and winners), Greg & Jane Tillotson (reaching their first finals after several attempts) and Matt & Sheree Riley (reaching the finals in the second year they took part). So, it was great to see new teams playing at the finals, and more mixed pairs than ever before.

The crowd were treated to some excellent shots by all. Each match, two semis and the final, were to be best of 3 games, but none needed to go to that third game. Iain Graham was wearing his International Boules Referee t-shirt so got the job (as usual) with Ian Ruffle rushing onto court with his tape measure when required to help with close decisions (he is bendier than Iain G).

Both semis went the way of the favourites, though the scores do not reflect how close some 'ends' were. Tom & Louise beat Greg & Jane 13-5, 13-0 and Rory & Cam beat Matt & Sheree 13-3. 13-9. The Final was between two previous winning teams and was a thrilling match. Tom and Louise were in particularly good form with some excellent shots, striking just where they needed to go (we may have to check for performance enhancing drugs in future). So, the final scores were a win to Tom & Louise 13-7, 13-4 and they took back the classy bronze trophy for their mantelpiece. We will all try and beat them again next year!

Many thanks to all those who support and enjoy this competition. I know

many teams are already looking forward to next year's boules competition, having enjoyed some very pleasant sessions at the Town Hall with friends old and new. There's always room for new teams, so come along and play next year. All standards are welcome. Any age also. This year the age range was 8 to 80+. Entries will be taken in April 2024 so watch this space. We will also run some 'intro to the game' sessions in April.





# **Tales of Bardfield Fair**

All through the preceding night, the rattle of gipsy caravans and the patter of the sheep, the clop-clop of ponies from Wales and the New Forest would be heard in the lanes ... and all through the next morning, farmhands would go trudging past, under the hot June skies, with their jackets slung over their arms.

very year from 1262 until the outbreak of WWI, Great Bardfield held a Horse Fair on June 22<sup>nd</sup>. By the first part of the 20th century the fair had declined – perhaps because so many horses were needed for WWI or simply because the introduction of the motorcar and traction engine gradually replaced the need for so many working horses. After WWI the fair was held intermittingly, with more emphasis on the funfair. The last time the fair was held was in 2000 to mark the millennium.



For centuries the Great Bardfield Horse Fair was a major event in East Anglia's rural calendar, attracting dealers from as far a field as Wales and the New Forest to trade in horses, sheep and cattle. For the inhabitants of the village it was the most significant date of the year. It was the day that new potatoes were dug, that the first peas were harvested, the first gooseberry tarts of the year baked and 'Barful Fair Pudding' was served. Farm hands rose early to get their jobs done so they could enjoy the fair. The inns and beer houses were open all day until the barrels ran dry and many local people were allowed to sell beer and homemade food by special permit to help feed all the visitors. Extra constables were drafted in to help keep law and order and the Cage on Bridge Street was used to house the drunk and disorderly.

Henry C. Warren in his book about rural life, This Land is Yours, describes the scene: "Sheep and cattle were penned at either side of the main street, whilst the horses, combed and braided for the occasion, were tethered by the score to the churchyard railings". Warren goes on to say that after the morning cattle sales, farmers would retire to

The Vine for lunch, "served to them on trestle-tables out in the yard," consisting of "beef and pudden' and peas, and cherry–tart with cream – and all for a bob!"

Bardfield Fair was not just for the working folk of the village. All classes enjoyed the event. A.F.J. Brown in Prosperity and Poverty – Rural Essex, 1700-1815 tells us that by the end of the 18th century, the fair was, "attended, as usual by the fashionables of the county."

Miss Buck who used to live at Bucks House opposite The Vine wrote this account of Bardfield Fair in the early 20th century when the funfair was the principal attraction.

"Stalls were set up on either side of the High Street where all sorts of exciting things, toys, etc, were on sale. There was no pavement outside Bucks House. Water carts kept down the dust in dry weather, but if the season were wet the road would become a quagmire. There were swings by the Quaker Meeting House gate; there were coconut shies and shooting galleries. On one occasion, during the setting up of the roundabouts, which was a great business as they were complicated contraptions, the brick wall surrounding our garden was damaged. This caused a commotion which all added to our entertainment. As darkness drew on, the naphtha lamps would be lit, and the crowds and noise would increase. The gaily-painted roundabout horses began to whirl faster and faster to the sound of the same old tunes. The music continued till midnight and later. Sleep was difficult, but who cared? Certainly we children did not, for the night was full of magic. It was Fair Week once more."

Peggy Swift was born in 1917 and lived in the village all her life. In 2000 she recounted her memories of Bardfield Fair to Janet Dyson. The resulting booklet, So Long at the Fair, is an evocative account of Bardfield Fair, including two stories connected with Bardfield Fair, handed down through the generations. A Bunch of Blue Ribbons and the gruesome story of the Bloody Sticks murder. The booklet is available at Between the Lines and the Cottage Museum and is well worth a read.

# A CANDLELIT CHRISTMAS

# From the Vicarage...

he fast-paced spread of news in the modern world is such that, between writing something and it going to print, much can change. I am very conscious that I am writing this piece having only recently heard about the appalling escalation of conflict in the Holy Land, and with little idea how things will look by the time these words are read. But I am also conscious that, whatever the developments – and we pray they will be in the direction of peace – these words will be read in a season when we are remembering the consequences of wars which are now regarded as part of history.

When we think of this latest chapter in a long-running conflict alongside continued fighting in Ukraine and other less well-publicised outbreaks of war, it is easy to wonder whether our human family has learnt anything at all from the world wars of the twentieth century. It gives us a reminder of the importance of our continued observance of Remembrance, particularly when we learn that many of today's conflicts have their roots in matters not properly addressed when what we think of as 'historical' wars came to an end. Wars cast a long shadow over history – often longer than the memories of the individual people who experienced them.

Helplessness and hopelessness are easy and natural reactions to the waves of 'bad news' which reach us from across the world, but remembrance is also a time of hope. One of the most important things we do at Remembrance services is to read the names of individuals who lost their lives in recent wars. On the one hand, this brings home to us the human cost of war, but on the other, it reminds us of the individual acts of courage and selflessness which we always find amidst the horror of armed conflict. Somehow, even the worst we see of ourselves cannot extinguish that core of humanity which we have in common with every single other person – and that, surely, is something worth remembering.

# **GREENFINGERS**

ovember doesn't give many good days to garden, 'an excuse to stay in' say those not so keen.' 'Sun's out, pull on the wellies,' say those ardent gardeners, me being one of them. This is the list of jobs for all.

- 1. Do a bit of tidying, this means leave nice looking seed heads for the birds but cut drab plants to 30 centimetres.
- 2. Edge the lawn, it does make a difference to the garden.
- 3. Imagine scent from winter flowers so acquire some as it is a good time to plant. Simple bulbs have fragrance like narcissus and some tulips e.g. orange Ballerina, do smell like orange peel. Plus there are shrubs Daphne, Sarcococca (Christmas Box) Witch Hazel and Viburnums. 'No room!' you shout. Well go for the first two as they are small.
- 4. More pleasure to anticipate for those that look ahead, plant lily bulbs now -yes even those that will be August flowering 10 pink Tiger Lily just planted and a little heap of chipped bark/leaf mould nestles them for the winter.
- 5. Improve the look of a border, (yes, as written last month,) 3 pots, 3 grasses with winter appeal e.g. Carex Evergold, Uncinia Rubra, Ophiopogon, black grass. Plus violas but choose one colour to contrast with your grass. Under these are your Spring gems: BULBS.



# **Nature Notes - Oak Apple**

omeone asked the question what is this? It was what is commonly known as an Oak apple which can be found growing on oak trees. They are not a fruit at all, they are in fact a deformed leaf. The adult female oak gall wasp which is wingless crawls up the tree and along the branches to reach a leaf. She then lays a single egg on a leaf

and as the eggs hatch and form larvae, they excrete a liquid which irritates the leaf causing it to wrap round and start to form a gall; a round ball 1 to 2 inches in diameter, The larvae feeds on the gall tissue until it matures. It gets mated then falls to the ground, burrows into the soil where it lays eggs on the oak tree roots. Once these eggs hatch into larvae they feed on the oak tree roots for over a year. Once these have matured into wasps they emerge from the soil, some male, some wingless females which start the whole process over again. We are told oak wasps are beneficial to the tree but I



can't find out in what way, may be it's to do with fertilization if the males fly from tree to tree. It's a well-known fact that the oak tree is host to more insects than any other tree. Oak gall wasps are very small and don't look like any other wasp, gone are the familiar stripes these are brown and shiny with a flat abdomen.

Oak apples have been well known in folk law, they still have oak apple day in some parts of England and Wales and there is also an Oak Apple song. As oak apples mature they turn to shades of brown, these have been collected and provided colour dyes for artists. Vincent van Gogh used oak apple gall ink to tint his drawings.

Before the 15th century, people attending a church service would stand or kneel. When benches or pews were introduced, they were sometimes decorated by skilled craftsmen. In particular, the top of the ends of some pews were carved with figures called finials or poppyheads.

The word poppyhead comes from Latin via Old French meaning the poop or figurehead of a ship. Poppyheads can be found in churches across the country and they are particularly prevalent in East Anglia. The Hundred Parishes has some fascinating examples.

The carved figures can represent almost anything. Some are of flowers or fruit or animals. Mythical creatures or demons were introduced to remind parishioners that if they led a sinful life they would go to hell. Saints and angels however meant that if you lived a good life you would go to heaven.

You will also find carved creatures depicting saints. In St. Mary's, Hatfield Broad

Ickleton – St Michael weighing souls

Oak, 300-year-old poppyheads symbolize saints, with a lion for Mark, a bull for Luke and an eagle for John, while Matthew is represented by a 'divine man'.



Hatfield Broad Oak – a bull representing St Luke

Ickleton's parish church has some fine examples of medieval carved poppyheads. One shows St. Michael weighing souls of the dead and another features a dragon-like creature.

In Wendens Ambo parish church you will find a fearsome-looking beast which you may meet if your soul goes to hell!

Linton's church has a wide range of subjects including scribes resting their books, one on the back of an angel and another on a dragon.
